It contains information that can help eliminate the unfounded fears and myths surrounding the spread of HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. The book provides facts to help students develop the desired understanding and responsible behavior that can prevent the spread of HIV.
AIDS What You Need To Know	Branca	This book is intended for students in grades four through six. It contains information that can help eliminate the unfounded fears and myths surrounding the spread of HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. The book provides facts to help students develop the understandings and responsible behaviors that can prevent the spread of HIV.
Children and the AIDS Virus	Hausherr	A book that young children can understand about a complex disease that scientists barely understand themselves. It reassures readers that contracting AIDS is unlikely through normal childhood activities, and then shows attractive children who indeed have AIDS and are likely to die. The clear black-and-white photos and large print make this seem like a picture book, but much more information is given in smaller print at the bottoms of pages.
Does AIDS Hurt?	Quackenbush	A book about educating young children about AIDS. Covers when to bring up the topic of anticipating problems that might arise in discussing with young children; when a child, family or friends are at risk for or infected; with the school with infected students or staff; staying updated on information and more.
Learning About Aids and Other Diseases	King	An interactive book that helps explain AIDS and other diseases to children. The book has review sections where you answer questions about the text. There are

		also activity suggestions throughout the book.
